

FOCUS FEATURE

MERCYHURST COLLEGE CAMPUS MINISTRY

Have you ever walked the streets as a homeless person looking for a place to sleep? Looking for a meal? Have you ever shopped for groceries and then carried two bags for a mile because that's how far you live from the store and you have no car?



Twenty students from Mercyhurst College can Greg Baker answer "yes" to those questions. Under the leadership of Greg Baker, Director of Campus Ministry at Mercyhurst College, the students



spent the weekend of March 25-26, in a Lenten Immersion Experience in hunger and homelessness.

"When we advertise the Lenten experience, we have a waiting list within a couple of days," Baker explained. "Most of our students have grown up with too much comfort and are too sheltered from

the realities of poverty and various injustices. They hunger for real experiences and real people with real stories."

On Friday the students served at the Kids Cafe, cleaned the building, prepared a dinner for their guest speaker, Jerry, a once homeless man, walked the streets of downtown Erie with him, reflected and prayed together, and spent the night at the Kids Cafe. On Saturday they prepared breakfast, prayed, and visited places that served the poor of Erie: Upper Room, Catholic Charities, Multicultural Community Resource Center and the Emmaus Soup Kitchen where they served a meal, ate together and ended the experience.

"We are so grateful for Emmaus Ministries and their partnership with us to offer students the powerful experiences in the Erie community," said Baker.

Student Responses

"Walking around with Jerry in the cold and seeing where he had spent nights outside when he was homeless was most meaningful for me. It made everything I have ever heard about homelessness very real. His story was right in front of us, so how could we not feel emotional." -Sarah

"It taught me that people who are on the street aren't just people who live on the streets. They actually try to partake in a job, but a minimum wage job isn't enough to sustain a livable life." -Theresa

"The experience showed me that service may not just be physical labor, but can be as simple as sitting down with a child and talking." -Madeline

"I am used to praying for the homeless during the petitions in mass, but the whole situation was so abstract to me: I've always had a roof over my head and a family on whom I could rely...but after speaking with people who have no one to help them, I realize what a horrible thing being homeless is. It's not only a physical struggle, but also an emotional struggle." -Victoria

"The most meaningful experience for me was when I heard a young boy at the Kids Cafe come up to Mrs. V, I think she was in charge, and say, 'Can I please stay here longer? I don't want to go home yet!' That was really touching. It made me realize how much of a difference just a few hours each day is for these children." -Rebecca

Holy Thursday Celebration

Contemporary Stations

Emmaus Soup Kitchen was one of the stops for the 31st annual Good Friday Contemporary Stations of the Cross, an 8-mile pilgrimage from the downtown Erie Cathedral to Mount Saint Benedict Monastery with prayerful "stations" along the way. Here is a reading from the soup kitchen station:

I am Lisa. Things are a lot different since Daddy left. We used to keep a big bowl of fruit on the counter, and



we could have some anytime we wanted. Now Mom hardly ever buys fruit. It costs too much, she says. Mom got a new job now. But she doesn't make as much as Daddy did; so we have to move from our apartment. I don't know where we'll go when we move. It makes Mom feel bad to say "no" all the time. So I try not to ask for much.

Over 100 people participated in the stations that were organized by Benedictines for Peace.



FACE to FACE: EMMAUS VOLUNTEERS

WHAT NEWS EVENT HAS IMPACTED YOUR LIFE MOST DEEPLY? We asked this of Emmaus volunteers.

Nora Horihan, volunteer Emmaus Food Pantry, 20+ years

News event: Sandanista Revolution in late 1970s



During 1977 and 1978 I lived in Costa Rica for 15 months during the most intense time of the Sandanista Revolution in Nicaragua. Many people came over the border as refugees from the fighting. I read American newspapers and got some information about the revolution. And I heard stories from the refugees about what was really going on. It opened my eyes that what we hear up here, might not be the whole story. I think young

people should spend time in a foreign country so they would have the same experience. It changed my life.



Norann Brugger, Kids Cafe volunteer, 11 years

News event: Bay of Pigs, 1960s

I was 25 years old in 1962 and living in Baltimore, was a new bride and had a new baby. My husband was working on a special project and went to the Pentagon in Washington, D.C. every day. I felt very vulnerable during those tense days of the John F. Kennedy administration during the Bay of Pigs. We were living close to the center of American government and worried about what would happen



if we were attacked. We thought about how you should live your life because tomorrow was an unknown. We had a shelter with food in the basement of the apartment. It was in a storage room and was shared by all four apartments. It was a scary time.
