Mary, Undoer of Knots

From Sister Mary

Dear Friends of Emmaus.

Like most Catholic girls who grew up in the 40's and 50's I had a great devotion to Mary. My family prayed the daily rosary together, made 9-day novenas to her, and recited her litany during weekly Marian services. And how I looked forward to May, the month of Mary, with its special altars, processions, beautiful hymns, and crowning.

Although I still pin my mother's rosary inside the pocket of my slacks, the intensity of my devotion waned over the years. Until recently, when I felt a magnet pulling me toward Mary. Each morning now I sit with a different painting of Mary (I found a boxed collection of Mary images) and pray with her. That's how I discovered an image titled, Mary, Undoer of Knots. In the classic painting a serene Mary and the angels that surround her are all, with great ease, untying knots on a long ribbon that stretches from heaven to earth, undoing all the snarls that bind us.

I had never met Mary, Undoer of Knots. It was love at first sight. I knew I needed her as soon as I found her. I knew she was the perfect Mary for Emmaus.

So many "knots" walk through our door every day—in the guests, in the staff, in the volunteers, in myself. There are the taut knots of despair, self-righteousness, poverty, addiction, privilege. And on and on.

When a friend recently gave me a contemporary painting of Mary, Undoer of Knots, by Lynn Garlick, I took it as a sign that we should revisit May as the month of Mary and dedicate this issue to her. I placed my new Mary on the cover and decided to use the striking paintings of our Emmaus artist friend, Brother Mickey McGrath, OSFS, to highlight and pray for the "knots" that we are trying to unravel at Emmaus. Please join me in praying for these intentions.

I know it's difficult to untie any knot if you are tense, troubled, or agitated. It's my prayer that Emmaus be the calm and loving presence that enables "knots" to slip open with ease. Or as the prayer on the back of the Garlick painting reads, "Holy Mother, Undoer of Knots,...free me...so I am rendered harmless and move in the world with clarity of mind and kindness of heart." Let us Pray: Mother of Sorrows, untangle the knot of hard-heartedness, so that we may never become content with our own efforts and cease to embrace the suffering around us.

A young father has been coming to the soup kitchen with his 1½ month old daughter. "How is it going caring for her on your own?" I asked. "I'm exhausted," he replied. "I need more sleep." Someone at a table nearby asked, "Where's her mom?" He looked away and then said, "She's out of town." But everyone knew what that meant: "she's in jail." We have quite a few single parents who bring their children to the soup kitchen. But this is the first time I've met a single father with such a young child...a child that is still drinking from a bottle.

Let us pray: Source of Our Joy, untangle the knot of despair, so that we may always have hope for our guests' futures, and celebrate every small victory with them.

One of the guests at the soup kitchen was laughing and talking loudly to her friend and Sister Mary went over to find out what was causing such joy. The woman jumped up, picked Sister Mary up in the air, and exclaimed, "Oh, my God, I can't believe it! I just found out that Sister Rosanne is not dead." She put Sister Mary back down and explained: "I was so upset when I heard the rumors that Sister Rosanne got really sick with pneumonia and died. I was so sad I couldn't even come to Emmaus. But today I found out that the rumors aren't true... Sister Rosanne is alive and well!" Then Sister Mary pulled out her cell phone, called Sister Rosanne, and said to the woman. "Here, talk to her."

Let us pray: Our Lady, Help of the Addicted, untangle the knot of dependencies, so that all people may live freely and with dignity.

"Thank you so much for coming and volunteering each month," Sister Mary said to a volunteer. The woman responded, "Honestly...the main reason I come is because my son was an addict and he came here. He was in rehab nine times and it never worked. But thank God, he's now four years sober and holds a job. I come here to help because the soup kitchen was here when he needed it. It helped keep him alive."

Let us pray: Queen of the Rosary, untangle the knot of fear, so that we may have the courage to speak out for those who have no voice. Our Lady of Light: Help of the Addicted



I was one of three members of the Emmaus family who were arrested in Washington, D.C. in early 2018 for praying the rosary at the Senate Rotunda on behalf

of individuals who immigrated to the United States as children and now face possible deportation. Sister Anne McCarthy, Emmaus board member; Sam Miller, Emmaus volunteer; and I participated in the Catholic Day of Action with Dreamers which brought together over 200 Catholics from across the country to ask Congress to enforce a clean Dream Act and a path to citizenship for DACA recipients. I'd never been arrested before, but when traditional ways of contacting Congress were unsuccessful, I wanted to join other Catholics who believe that our faith demands we take action in unjust situations. And I have to say that praying the rosary during our protest made me weep. It grounded me in my family's faith and

became a unifying and powerful prayer for justice. Following our act of civil disobedience, all the participants were fingerprinted, photographed, and released.

Seat of Wisdom



Let us pray: Seat of Wisdom, untangle the knots of ignorance and judgment, so that all woundedness may be met with empathy and compassion.

"Late this morning at the food pantry a young man, probably about 30-years-old, came in the door and he was crying," said Emmaus staff member Sister Karen. "Harriet, our volunteer who signs up new guests, sat him down and listened to him about what was going on in his life. About ten minutes later, Harriet had him laughing and in line to get his bags of food. I was so impressed at how Harriet responded to this man. She was so spontaneous and genuine in her care, as if she were following some inner wisdom."

Garden Madonna




Let us pray: Garden Madonna, untangle the knot of wastefulness, so that everyone may enjoy nature's abundance.

Inner-city gardens are sprouting up all over the city and Emmaus Grove: The Urban Farm School was one of the first. What many people don't know is that Solomon's Porch Apostolic Assembly, located next to the kitchen, owns the land and lends it to Emmaus free of charge. Pastor Rick Sprague explains that it's the church's way of tithing and besides, "We both do God's work and certainly we can share the land." The Garden Madonna must be smiling since over 2,000 pounds of food are harvested there and shared at the Emmaus pantry and kitchen. I experienced

another kind of abundant garden today when I was in the family dining room at the kitchen. Three different languages were being spoken at the same time—one family was speaking English, another Spanish, and a third, Arabic. It not only sounded beautiful but reminded me of a multi-flowered garden.

RESTORING HOPE

Saint Luke's

Following a pep talk from Father Mike DeMartinis, the second and third graders at Saint Luke School made enough minestrone soup to serve all the guests at Emmaus. Each student added a small item to the boiling pot—a spice, a tomato, a handful of carrots, or beans--and produced a healthy soup for Erie's hungry. The soup makers were part of an all-school effort to support Emmaus during Catholic Schools Week. Preschool and prekindergarten children contributed several hundred bags of candy for guests to take with them. Kindergarten and first graders made 250 ham and cheese sandwiches. Fourth and fifth graders assembled pans of homemade macaroni and potato Second and third gradsalad. Sixth, seventh and eighth graders took care of desert making dozens of cookies. And the faculty provided the main course—25 pans of homemade lasagna.
