To what can we compare Master Gardener Cindy Soltys?

Every spring she appears to assist the children in planning and caring for the flower garden in front of the Kids Cafe and the vegetable garden at the Inner-City Neighborhood Art House. "The love of gardening is a seed once sown that never dies," Gertrude Jekyll wrote. Also taking root in that "love of gardening seed" are a sense of responsibility, an experience in faithfulness, and a love of beauty.



MISS CINDY IS LIKE the tomatoes and zucchini and vegetables that she plants—she nourishes the lives of the children. She takes groups of Kids Cafe children on field



trips to her home to play and "hang out" and prepare a home cooked meal. Then the children enjoy a sit down meal with Cindy and her husband, Mister Greg. A fresh peach or a strawberry is a new experience for some of the children. So is the concept of a potato. As one of the girls tells it, "You peel the potatoes, you boil them and then you put them in

the mixer and you wait until they get soft. At home I get them out of a box."

INDEED, MISS CINDY HAS BECOME a living master gardener. She has grown into the wisdom of the Chinese proverb, "Cultivate the garden within." Goodness, like lovely flowers, blooms inside her.

WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE BOOK?

I love all things Irish and about Ireland notes **Pam Eckberg, Food Pantry volunteer**. Pam recommends *Angela's Ashes* by Frank McCourt. Set in the 1930s and 40's this true story depicts the life and struggles of a poverty stricken family. It is a bit sad. These wholesome people work so hard and every time they are beaten down. Yet, they do make it. If they could make it, any one could. It is a lesson in humility, teaching people they can do well and make it in the real world.







The Jean Auel series of early civilizations (Earth's Children), like, *Clan of the Cave Bear*, are favorite books of **Soup Kitchen volunteer, Karen Shrum**. The writing is excellent. The research is phenomenal. I have interest in early civilizations and these books show how far as a species we have come. We take so much for granted in our lives and in these books you read how it all evolved and developed. Also, early civilizations were religious and deeply spiritual. Ayla, a lead character, was an outcast in her clan, yet she was determined and persevered to become a leader. It is fascinating reading.



I have 2 books that I would recommend says **George Anthony, Food Pantry volunteer**. *Walden* by Henry David Thoreau is a favorite because I relate to him. He's a lot like me. We have the same ideas and the same philosophies. In Victor Hugo's *Les Miserables* I connect with the Jean Val Jean's character, his inner strength and attitude. You come in contact with the reality of the man, the person.

But you must your gentleness and your smile keep.


Giving soup and bread isn't all that you can do.


